BELLEVILLE DIWALI CELEBRATION - A BIG SUCCESS!

Belleville held its very first Diwali event and it was a resounding success! In the past several years there has been a growing population of Indian newcomers to Belleville and the surrounding area. This is mostly due to the expanding international student population at Loyalist College and the many efforts the Bay of Quinte region has made to attract newcomers.

We caught up with one of the key organizers of the festival, and QUIS client, Hardik Patel. Hardik's dream was to create an event that would bridge the gap between local residents and Indian nationals who want to settle in our community. At the same time, the Belleville Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) committee had been discussing the idea of a Diwali event to help Indian nationals feel more at home in the community. The EDI connected with Hardik and another international student graduate, Anjani Surelia, and the idea took off from there. Loyalist College was also central to assisting with providing volunteers and other support for the event.

The event was held on October 17, 2021, but there are usually 5 days of celebration for Diwali and the actual date of Diwali this year was November 4th. The main idea behind Diwali in India is to provide light to our lives in order to win the war over darkness that we may experience. With the community slowly recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic, there couldn't have been a better time for a celebration of light. Hardik says that even though there are many different aspects of Diwali that are celebrated, the holiday is given priority in India because all Indians take part in the celebration. Like the Canadian Christmas, Indians take the time during Diwali to meet friends and family, gather together, eat great food, dance, and play traditional music. As the celebration is all about lighting up darkness, evening events usually include fireworks.

At the Belleville event, there was a fantastic feeling of joy and festivity which drew around 250 to 300 people. Hardik said he was particularly moved and inspired by the fact that when he looked out into the crowd, he saw many people of diverse backgrounds celebrating, smiling and dancing together. For Hardik, it was especially rewarding to see his dream of togetherness and understanding unfolding at the event.

Next year, the organizing committee want to go bigger and better with delicious Indian food, a bigger venue and maybe even fireworks! And coming very soon, we may see a special Indian food festival in the Belleville area. Stay tuned!

COVID-19: NEWS & UPDATES

INFORMATION ABOUT VACCINE CLINICS, REOPENING PLANS, ONGOING HEALTH & SAFETY MEASURES

PROOF OF VACCINATION STATUS

Beginning September 22, 2021 some public places started to require proof of vaccinations in order to enter the building including restaurants, community centres, gyms & fitness centres, arenas and most municipal buildings. Any form of transportation managed by the government also now requires proof of vaccination including public transit (buses), airlines, and VIA Rail trains.

You can download your vaccination certificate on the Government of Ontario website at <u>https://covid-19.ontario.ca/get-proof/</u>. As of October 2021, an enhanced certificate with a QR code is also available to download. **Both types of vaccination certificates remain valid as proof.**

VACCINE CLINICS STILL AVAILABLE

Currently, all individuals aged 12 and over are eligible for their first or second COVID-19 vaccination. Accessing vaccines is NOT dependent on your immigration status - <u>it is available to everyone in Ontario</u>. Contact Hastings & Prince Edward Public Health at 613-966-5500 if you do not have a provincial health card and want to receive a COVID-19 vaccination. There are also walk-in clinics available in various locations that do not require an appointment. REOPENING PLANS & UPDATES

Much of the province of Ontario along with businesses, schools, restaurants and community spaces have reopened to the public with restrictions and guidelines in place to prevent outbreaks of COVID-19. Ontario is currently in Stage 3 of its official reopening plan and all residents are still encouraged to be cautious, continue social distancing, wear masks inside with large groups, and keep washing your hands. <u>Please continue to follow guidelines and safety protocols in place at various locations</u>. Please remember to be patient and understanding as we continue to work through a public health emergency.

****Note**** Office appointments at QUIS are being scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday for settlement services only. If you need to see a settlement worker in person, you will need book your appointment in advance and wear a mask the entire time you are in the office. There will also be a quick COVID-19 screening upon your arrival.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING


QUIS held its AGM virtually again this year on October 27, 2021

On October 27th, the QUIS Board of Directors held its 34th Annual General Meeting via Zoom. Paul Osborne, President of the Board, delivered the annual report which noted and celebrated QUIS' 35 years of providing settlement services in the Quinte region. The report included highlights of QUIS from its founding in 1986 by Susan Walker and a group of dedicated volunteers to the sudden and challenging pivot to remote services during the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Member of Parliament for the Bay of Quinte Riding, Ryan Williams, brought greetings from the federal government and expressed his gratitude for the work QUIS does in welcoming newcomers to the Quinte area. He noted that he wants to support an increase in immigration to the region and see newcomers achieving better job outcomes by filling much-needed positions with local employers. MP Williams said that he looks forward to working with QUIS in the future.

From October 2020 to October 2021, QUIS provided services to 436 unique clients, 56% of whom learned about QUIS through their family and friends. The three largest client groups served were Permanent Residents, International Students, and Canadian Citizens. The top ten languages spoken by this past year's clients are English, Tagalog, Hindi, Arabic, Punjabi, Spanish, Gujarati, French, Malayalam, and Italian. The top fifteen countries of origin were India. Canada, the Philippines, Syria, the USA, Jamaica, Mexico, the UK, Brazil, Afghanistan, Colombia, Germany, Italy, Portugal, and Turkey.

The QUIS team would like to thank everyone who attended the Annual General Meeting and especially to MP Ryan Williams for making time to attend while the new Parliament is still forming. The QUIS Board of Directors would also like to thank Aptie Sookoo, who has retired from the Board after twelve years of service. The Board expresses their sincere gratitude to Aptie for his contributions, and welcomes new Board member, Sergeant Jeremy Ashley of the Belleville Police.

PROCESSING DELAYS CONTINUE

CIC News website recently posted an article outlining the application backlog at IRCC and reported that there are currently 1.8 million pending applications at various phases of processing. There are roughly 548,000 permanent residence applications in all immigration classes and roughly 468,000 citizenship applications. NEW TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS COMING INTO EFFECT

The Omicron variant of COVID-19 has caused the Canadian government to put into place new travel restrictions to prevent the spread of this new variant. Air travelers will once again need to show negative test results to arrive in certain countries and re-enter Canada. CANADA ADDING NEW VACCINATIONS TO APPROVED LIST FOR TRAVELERS

Effective November 30, Canada has expanded the list of approved vaccinations for those looking to enter the country. The expanded list now includes Sinopharm, Sinovac and COVAXIN. LOCAL IMMIGRATION PARTNERSHIP

Information & Updates on recent activities of the QLIP

The Quinte Local Immigration Partnership (QLIP) has had a busy year so far! The QLIP is a partnership of over 72 members and is made up of regional employers, non-profit organizations, Municipal, Provincial and Federal governments, educational institutions, health care and legal services providers who work together to support and address the needs of newcomers in our community with issues such as employment, diversity and equity, social welfare and health. The QLIP meets approximately once every two months to discuss partner members' projects and programs related to these types of issues.

More than 9 new partners have joined since 2020 and QLIP continues to invite new members to the table. Some of the ongoing projects since the spring of 2021 have included a QLIP Anti-racism subcommittee that is geared towards working on specific anti-racism projects in the community to create awareness, action and solutions. The sub-committee is currently looking at several funding options to initiate an Antiracism survey for the community.

QLIP has supported the Ontario Immigrant Nominee Program (OINP) Regional Immigration Pilot lead by the Cities of Belleville and Quinte West over the two-year period of the project. Lead coordinators from the OINP presented information about the project at a recent QLIP meeting in September 2021. The project is coming to a close at the end of December, but has been very successful supporting the permanent immigration of over 75 newcomers to the region!

QLIP is also proud to be a member of the Belleville Equity, Diversity and Inclusion committee supporting excellent events such as the first National Day of Truth and Reconciliation event held on September 30th in Belleville and the exciting new Diwali Festival held on October 17th for the first time in Belleville.

Working collaboratively with its member agencies, QLIP will continue to look at issues of growing concern in 2022 such as health, housing and employment for newcomers in our community.

REMEMBRANCE DAY IN CANADA

Remembrance Day is observed across North America and in many Commonwealth countries around the world on November 11. It is a memorial day that began in 1919 following the end of World War I to honour military members who have died in battle or otherwise in the line of duty.

The 11th of November was chosen because the fighting in World War I stopped at 'the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month' in 1918. Today, members of peacekeeping missions, war time nurses & doctors, and humanitarian agencies are also recognized in ceremonies.

In the lead up to Remembrance Day, people buy artificial poppies that they pin on their clothing. The poppy is a symbol of Remembrance Day based on the poem *In Flanders Fields*, written by John McCrae who was a medical officer during the First World War and lived in Guelph, Ontario.

On November 11th, people gather at war memorials (cenotaphs) for Remembrance Day services. Sombre music is played, wreaths are laid, prayers are read, as is John McCrae's poem. At 11 o'clock, two minutes' silence is observed. In Ontario, Remembrance Day is not a statutory holiday, although many businesses are closed on that day. Schools have activities related to Remembrance Day leading up to the day, and may have their own ceremonies on the 11th of November.

The man commonly known as Santa Claus can go by many names – he is also called Father Christmas, Saint Nicholas and Kris Kringle. Many people around the world know the image of a jolly man who delivers presents to good boys and girls on Christmas Eve.

The origins of Santa Claus go back to the third century, to the real St. Nicholas. It is said that Nicholas gave away all his money and travelled around helping the poor and sick. It is believed he lived near modern day Turkey. Over time, he became known as the patron saint of children and remains one of the most popular saints.

St. Nicholas was especially admired by the Dutch. It was Dutch immigrants that brought this tradition to North America. St. Nicholas' feast day is celebrated in Europe on December 6th. The name Santa Claus even comes from the Dutch "Sinter Klaas", which is a short form of Sint Nikolaas.

The 1823 poem "A Visit From St. Nicholas" by Clement Clarke Moore further popularized Santa Claus in the North American imagination. In 1841, thousands of children visited a shop in Philadelphia, USA to see a life-sized Santa Claus model. Eventually, stores started having their own versions of Santa Claus, whom children could visit and explain what gifts they wanted for Christmas.

Since then, there have been countless stories, movies and other depictions of Santa Claus. He is one of the best known and best loved characters of all time.

Will this tradition change? Of course! It already has. My "boys" are now grown up; the eldest lives with his wife in Australia. Life is constantly changing and we need to move with it or we sink. Traditions are fabulous, until they become too binding or unbending. I have learnt to love and appreciate what I have and to not force my own preferences on others. Joy comes from unconditional love not traditions. Wherever you are, whoever you are with, I wish you joy for this season of tradition making, or breaking.
